ABOUT TELEO UNIVERSITY

MISSION

Our Mission is to provide affordable, accessible, accredited education to pastors and ministry leaders who are seeking to *finish* the Great Commission through multiplying disciple makers and initiating saturation church planting.

DISTINCTIVES

Distance Education for Non-Traditional Students: Pastors that Remain On-the-Job

Teleo University plays a unique role in Theological Education by Extension. Teleo University's focus is on *finishing* the Great Commission of Jesus (Matthew 28:19-20) in each nation of the world by empowering indigenous pastors and church leaders. Teleo University only seeks students who are currently pastors, church planters, or key lay leaders. The average age of these non-traditional students is between 30 to 55 years old. These Christian leaders do not need to leave their ministries and families to attend classes. Teleo University offers no resident campus learning. Instead, students must remain in their local church ministry to implement what they learn in this unique distance education program.

Teleo University is not in competition with traditional Bible Colleges and Seminaries. Teleo University's core materials have been taught at a master's and doctoral level by several of the most prominent evangelical seminaries: Bethel Seminary, Columbia International University, Dallas Theological Seminary, Trinity Divinity School, Western Theological Seminary, West Africa Theological Seminary, and more.

Teleo University professors share their knowledge with students through a cross-culturally tested curriculum, printed lectures, and, more recently, web-based video coaching (currently English only). The course curriculum is translated into multiple languages. Therefore, Teleo University employs correspondence courses where students meet their professors only through printed lectures and perhaps video coaching, but without personal interaction. However, our print delivery, supported by local study groups and experienced facilitators, empowers our students to receive practical theological education without leaving their ministry or network of relationships.

By gathering students into study groups called T-Net Training Centers, students benefit from carefully prepared study materials, collaboration with fellow students, and facilitators who have studied and applied this curriculum in their ministries. Furthermore, the internet now offers more resources and allows student exposure to instructors, course authors, and subject matter experts through video coaching.

Trained as Trainers—The Disciple Making Model

Teleo University students participate in local study groups called T-Net Training Centers to complete assignments and enjoy vibrant student life interaction. Teleo University requires that pastors learn as students and then apply what they learn by leading, training, and implementing it in their local churches. Finally, every student must take on the disciple making mindset of training other pastors and church leaders (2 Timothy 2:2). Within the T-Net Training Centers, students form training teams to fulfill teaching practicum requirements of training this material to other pastors and church leaders.

INSTITUTIONAL GOALS

To accomplish our mission, Teleo University seeks to...

1. Keep the cost of education accessible to all students regardless of their financial means.
2. Provide students with learning resources adequate to meet the learning objectives of every study program.
3. Provide students with accredited degrees and certificates.
4. Complement not compete with existing Bible Colleges and Seminaries.
5. Recruit and train existing pastors and church leaders so they need not leave their current ministry positions but can apply their learning in their churches.
6. Make finishing the Great Commission the primary objective of all training programs.
7. Training students to revitalize local churches as disciple making churches.
8. Empower students as trainers and equippers who multiply disciple making training and saturation church planting to finish the Great Commission.

ADMISSION POLICIES

GENERAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students admitted to Teleo University are chosen based on spirituality, ministry zeal, academic ability, and their current role as a pastor, Bishop, church planter, church leader, or spouse. Teleo University is an educational institution for those non-traditional students who are already in vocational or bi-vocational pastoral ministry and church leadership. Teleo University provides Theological Education by Extension through a correspondence curriculum facilitated in T-Net Training Centers' study groups. Teleo University expects all students to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group.

SPIRITUAL REQUIREMENTS: BELIEF AND CHARACTER

Applicants must agree with, personally adhere to, and support Teleo University's Doctrinal Statement. By completing and signing the application, the applicant promises to respect and comply with the student standards of conduct of Teleo University. Applicants are to give evidence of Christian character and maintain a lifestyle consistent with biblical standards of a daily walk with Christ. Teleo University serves students in many cultures worldwide, and we acknowledge that some practices will be considered acceptable by Christians in one culture but not another. Therefore, Teleo University insists that the Scriptures guide godly conduct for both students and faculty. Where Scripture is clear, we will be clear, but where it is not, there will be freedom and grace.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE REQUIREMENTS

Serving is an integral part of the Christian life. Students enrolled in Teleo University are non-traditional students serving as pastors, church planters, and Christian leaders in the local church. Christian service is not something added to the coursework. It is integrated into the entire educational experience at Teleo University at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. Serving and loving non-Christians and helping disciples grow is a way of life for those seeking to finish the Great Commission.

STATEMENT OF FAITH

Teleo University is an Evangelical Protestant religious organization that holds to the essentials of biblical orthodoxy. The following statement addresses seven essentials upon which Christians have agreed throughout the centuries. These statements are inclusive rather than exclusive. We are eager to partner with denominations, churches, and other religious organizations that embrace the Christian faith's essentials. To maintain continuity and consistency, Teleo University expects faculty, administration, and students to agree with, personally adhere to, and support the following doctrinal statement:

We Believe:

1. The Scriptures, both Old, and New Testaments, to be the inspired Word of God, without error in the original writings, the complete revelation of His will for the salvation of men and women and the Divine and final authority for Christian faith practice.
2. In one God, creator of all things, infinitely perfect and eternally existing in three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
3. That Jesus Christ is true God and true man having been conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He died on the cross as a sacrifice for our sins, according to the Scriptures. Further, He arose bodily from the dead, ascended into heaven, where at the right hand of the Majesty on High, He is now our High Priest and Advocate.
4. The ministry of the Holy Spirit is to glorify the Lord Jesus Christ, and during this age, to convict men and women, regenerate the believing sinner, and indwell, guide, instruct, and empower the believer for godly living and service.
5. That mankind was created in the image of God but fell into sin and is, therefore, lost and only through regeneration by the Holy Spirit can salvation and spiritual life be obtained.
6. That the shed blood of Jesus Christ and His resurrection provide the only ground for justification and salvation for all who believe. That the new birth comes only by grace through faith in Christ alone and that repentance is a vital part of believing, but is in no way in itself a separate and independent condition of salvation; nor are any other acts such as confession, baptism, prayer, or faithful service to be added to believing as a condition of salvation.
7. In the bodily resurrection of the dead; of the believer to everlasting blessedness and joy with the Lord; of the unbeliever to judgment and everlasting conscious punishment.

ADMISSIONS PROCESS

Step 1: Join a T-Net Training Center Study Group

As a distance education institution, Teleo University does not offer traditional classroom education. Teleo University expects all students to participate in a local study group facilitated by T-Net International, where students collaborate with group members and complete directed instructional activities. Step 2: Submit the Application, Fee, Three Recommendations, and Transcripts

Applicants must submit the following items through their T-Net Training Center study group facilitator in their country or directly to the Office of Admissions if so directed:

1. **Admission Application:** Begin the application process by completing and submitting a paper application to your T-Net Training Center study group facilitator in your country. Click on the "Admissions" tab at www.teleouniversity.org to download an application.
2. **Application Fee:** Submit the \$50 (USD) non-refundable application fee through your T-Net Training Center study group facilitator, or for further assistance, contact admissions@teleouniversity.org. (NOTE: Diploma and Certificate students are **NOT required** to pay the \$50 application fee.)

3. **Acknowledge Agreement:** Affirm agreement with Teleo University's Statement of Faith and agree to abide by the school's policies and program requirements by checking the appropriate boxes on page two of the application form.
4. **Recommendations:** Teleo University requires three recommendation forms for all new applicants. Provide the following forms to the appropriate references. Have your references return the recommendation forms to your T-Net Training Center facilitator to submit to Teleo University along with your application and other required documents.
 - Recommendation 1: T-Net Training Center Trainer-Facilitator.
 - Recommendation 2: Personal Reference.
 - Recommendation 3: Ministry Reference.
5. **Transcript Evaluation:** Secondary school (high school), college, or university transcripts must be evaluated and reviewed for eligibility when you apply. The evaluation confirms if the student qualifies to begin the program for which the student has applied. To submit transcripts for evaluation:
 - Option 1: If your previous school offers official electronic (secure PDF) transcripts, this will be your fastest method. Request that your school send a copy to admissions@TeleoUniversity.org
 - Option 2: Submit a valid copy of your official transcript(s): 1) scan (PDF only) and upload the transcript document(s) through your tnetcenter.com online account, or 2) provide the transcript document(s) to your T-Net Training Center facilitator for document upload, or 3) if requested to do so, email the scanned (PDF only) transcript document(s) directly to admissions@teleouniversity.org.

Step 3: Receive a Notice of Acceptance

After Teleo University has received and processed your application fee and required documents, the admission office will send the applicant a notice of acceptance or non-admission. The admissions department will recommend an appropriate alternative program for students who do not qualify for requested program.

Step 4: Access Your Student Account

Using the "My Teleo" section of TeleoUniversity.org, access your Teleo University student online account.

Step 5: Pay Your Tuition and Proceed Through the Program

Teleo University enrolls students in prescribed programs of 9 or 10 four-month consecutive academic terms (36 or 40 months). There is no need to register for each term because of automatic enrollment for each term's prescribed courses. If you pay your tuition and earn passing grades, you will proceed automatically from one term to the next throughout the program.

 - Certification Credits (T-Net School of Ministry) \$25 per term credit
 - Undergraduate Credits (diploma and bachelor's degree)–\$70 per term credit

Through T-Net International School of Theology (TISOT), Teleo University offers a bachelor's degree program for pastors and church leaders who live outside of the United States.

BACHELOR OF PASTORAL MINISTRY (FOR STUDENTS LIVING OUTSIDE OF THE USA)

Program Description

This TISOT Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry (BPM) is designed for pastors and church leaders living outside of the United States. The program will increase their effectiveness in leading the local congregation to finish the Great Commission and impacting their nation or people group with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Students will direct a process of revitalization within their congregation that includes forming sequential disciple making small groups, church planting, apprenticing leaders, and teacher training. Students will improve their skills in Bible study, sermon preparation and delivery, and learning to teach their whole congregation Bible survey, evangelism, church history, and doctrine. Finally, students will be trained as trainers and will serve as part of a team to train a cohort of pastors in these foundational principles.

Program Outcomes

Students who complete the requirements for this program will have met the following objectives:

1. Develop skills in Bible study methods, preaching, and teaching
2. Learn to revitalize the church to become an intentional disciple making church
3. Gain knowledge and skill in directing sequential disciple making small groups
4. Experience personal transformation and spiritual formation as a disciple who seeks to make disciples
5. Implement an intentional disciple making philosophy of ministry for the local church
6. Develop the skills and knowledge required to be an effective pastoral leader
7. Multiply ministry by training and developing lay leaders, church planters, and other pastors

Program Requirements: International Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry

Students must complete a total of 120 semester credits for graduation, where each credit hour represents 40 learning hours or 2,000 minutes of academic engagement for each semester credit.

Admission Requirements

1. Successful completion of 12 years of schooling or its equivalent. In certain countries, this standard may vary. NOTE: Two years of diploma credit may be counted to meet the grade 12 university entrance requirement for a student who graduated at grade 10 then earned a diploma in theology or another field of study.
2. In exceptional cases, mature candidates (aged 30 and above with at least five years of ministry experience) who have not completed the prerequisite schooling may be admitted on a probationary status based on the Recognition of Prior Learning Policy (see the school catalog).
3. An applicant must be active in *ministry and authorized to implement assignments within a local church. *Active in Ministry typically is reflected by the following roles: Senior Pastor, Associate/Assistant Pastor, Church Planter, Elder/Church Leader, Pastor's Spouse, Bishop or Denominational Leader.

Program Structure and Delivery

Students participate in this program year-round by completing three 16-week terms each year for 10 terms. Students are independent learners but participate in regularly scheduled study groups called T-Net Training Centers led by experienced facilitators.

Graduation Requirements

The student completes all the requirements presented in the T-Net Tier 1 Auxiliary Manual, including:

- Successfully earn of 105 credits by completing the ten core T-Net curriculum courses and the Auxiliary Manual assignments.
- Successfully earn 15 additional credits hours through either of two options:
 - Option 1: Transfer undergraduate credits earned before starting the Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry program. Students have often completed one or more diploma programs. Diploma credits that were not used to meet the grade 12 admissions requirement may be transferred to meet the 15 additional credit hours to meet the 120 bachelor's degree international standard.
 - Option 2: Using library resources for reading and research, complete 15 credit hours of independent study courses anytime during the three years of the program (see the Independent Study (IS) syllabus below). This international bachelor's degree is only for non-residents of the United States. (Residents of the USA must complete the 30 credits of general education specified in the General Studies Policy.)
- Complete field education/practical ministry requirements.
 - Implementation of the Disciple Making Revitalization Project in the Local Church and record the results in the Ministry Data Sheets as outlined in the T-Net Tier 1 Auxiliary Manual
 - Completion of six Teaching Practicums (facilitate T-Net Courses 1-6 in a Training Center)
 - Completion of the two Ministry Practicums (coaching your students during Courses 1-6 and as they teach new students in a next generation in Courses 1-2)
- Model of the Student Life Character and Conduct and mastery of the Institutional Learning Outcomes.

BT321s FINISHING THE GREAT COMMISSION T-Net International School of Ministry TERM 1 COURSE SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION: BT321s Finishing the Great Commission

This course provides a biblical study of the Great Commission and how Jesus made disciples in training phases. Students will learn how to develop revival and reformation in their churches by training disciple making leaders in a model discipleship small group. Students will also learn to lead their churches to increase commitment and financial stewardship.

Credits: 8 credit hours (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

As a result of this course, the student will be able to:

- Teach the importance of finishing the Great Commission
- Begin to transform their church by starting to train disciple making leaders in a model small group
- Raise money to support the costs finishing the Great Commission, increasing weekly giving by 20% - 200%
- Begin to recruit others to join the student in the effort
- Know how to teach this course to others

Reading/Lecture Notes/ Group Discussions

They also begin to master the program content to prepare to become study group facilitators, mentors, and coaches for future students.

2. **1.2 Model Follow Me DBS group (15 grading points)**
Pastors - Start to disciple and train a majority of your primary church leaders (Church staff, elected leaders, adult influencers, adult group leaders and disciple makers) in a Model Follow Me group to equip them to be Disciple Making (DM) group leaders. Alternative for associate Pastors or non-pastors – You must be in this group with a pastor and must co-lead it. **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** These women will recruit and train (in a women's Follow Me group) the wives of the primary male leaders as well as any other primary leaders who are female. They will add the potential number of these together to determine the number of primary leaders they might train for grading purposes.
3. **1.3 Stewardship Preaching (25 grading points)**
Implement the Stewardship material you were taught. Implement all nine steps. Preach a four-week series on this as taught. Use signed commitment cards and the "Money-back guarantee" as taught to earn the highest score. Increase your weekly giving by at least 20%. Alternative for associate pastors and non-pastors – You must plan this with a pastor and must preach at least one of the sermons yourself). **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** These women will implement this in their women's Follow Me group, not by preaching to a congregation. Before they begin this, they must give each Follow Me group member a blank small piece of paper and ask each Follow Me group member to anonymously state their level of average weekly giving. Four weeks after teaching the stewardship series to their Follow Me group, the leader must do the same thing. Then she can compare giving before the series to giving after the series. (Example: there are 4 women in the Follow Me group. Before the series, the anonymous individual giving reported was 30 dollars for one, 20 for the second, 25 for the third and 15 for the fourth, for a total of 90 dollars. After teaching the four-week series, the anonymous individual giving was reported as 40 dollars for one, 35 for a second, 20 for a third and 25 for a third, for a total of 120 dollars. Subtract the starting giving level of 90 from the new giving level of 120 to find the increase of 30 dollars per week. Next, divide increase of 30 dollars by the original giving level of 90 dollars which equals .33 then multiply that by 100 to convert it to a percentage of 33%. Women must do steps 1 and 2 as written. Steps 3, 4,5,6,7 & 8 are done in their Follow Me group as described above. Step 9 is not required.
4. **1.4 Training Center Prospects (10 grading points)**
Use the pastor student prospect list called "**Prospect List for Future Training Center Pastors**" in your Auxiliary Manual and compile a list of at least 30 pastors or 50% of evangelical pastors in a 10 Km. radius from your church, along with their contact information. These are persons that you will plan to contact after Course 2 and seek to persuade to become students in the next-generation training center where you will be part of the training team. Associate pastors and non-pastors have the same assignment. Women married to pastors are assigned to help their husbands make the list and to include the wives of the pastors on the lists. **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** These female students are responsible to make this prospect list of persons who are in the same kind of ministries they are in. They must have half the number of contacts to get the same grade as pastors.
5. **1.5 Grammar Refresher (10 grading points)**
Study refresher course on Grammar until you have mastered it. Get help from a friend or another student if needed
6. **1.6 Course Exam (10 grading points)**
Master the material in Course 1. Study for the exam and receive an appropriate score on your exam.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: FP351.1s Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization

The Field Project for the Pastoral Ministry program documents how the pastor or staff have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization is the focus during the first two terms of the program. First, the student will create an initial report and evaluation of the disciple making health of the local church and the specific demographic and cultural context of the church. The student will document formative steps taken to revitalize the local church as a disciple making church: Identifying the primary church leaders in the local church; recruiting the primary church leaders to participate in the Model Follow Me DBS group; preparing curriculum for the Model Follow Me DBS group; and initial 3-6 Follow Me DBS group meetings with the primary church leaders. (*FP351 spans two terms for a total of 1 credit hour.*)

CLASS REQUIREMENTS/ASSIGNMENTS

1. Read Three Books

The student selects and reads three books focused on the independent study subject. For reading and research, the combined length of these books must be between 500-600 pages. Students may select from the pre-approved books listed in this syllabus and access the works through the Teleo University online library resources (usually in English) or local library resources (required for non-English local language research). The student may also select other appropriate books of approximately 200 pages. The student will record the pages read by completing "Reading and Research Report Forms."

2. Complete Reading and Research Reports

Students will complete three **four-page** "Reading and Research Report Forms," one set of forms for each book. (For example, in a 200-page book, the student will complete one page of the Reading and Research form for pages 1-50, one for pages 51-100, another for pages 101-150, and yet another for pages 151-200).

3. Write a Reflection Paper

The student will complete a reflection paper on the course subject based on their Reading and Research notes. The reflection paper should be both personal and practical and approximately two to four pages in length. Therefore, the reflection paper, based on reading these three books, must answer the following questions:

- What have I learned on this subject? (The student must include at least one parenthetical citation from each source as a quote or summary of an idea).
- Why is it important to me or my ministry context?
- How will I apply what I have learned in my life or ministry?
- What questions need further study?

4. Modern Language Association (MLA) Formatting

In their reflection paper, the student will use MLA parenthetical citations and bibliography as presented in the Teleo University "Style Guide."

5. Verbally Present the Reflection Paper

The student will verbally share the reflection paper. There are two convenient ways to complete this assignment:

- Present and discuss your paper in a triad with fellow T-Net Training Center students.
- Present and discuss your paper in a triad with disciple making leaders from your local church.

GRADING (see Appendix for grading rubric)

Independent study courses are completed on a pass/fail basis and do not affect the student's GPA (grade point average). No assignment can be left incomplete. Assignments are graded as follows

- 1. Read Three Books.** The student reads three books focused on the independent study subject with a combined 500-600 pages.
 - Three books with 600 total pages read = 4
 - Three books with 500 total pages read = 3

COURSE DESCRIPTION: FP351.2s Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization

The Field Project for the Pastoral Ministry program documents how the pastor or staff have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Field Project Formation: Local Church Revitalization is the focus during the first two terms of the program. First, the student will create an initial report and evaluation of the disciple making health of the local church and the specific demographic and cultural context of the church. The student will document formative steps taken to revitalize the local church as a disciple making church: Identifying the primary church leaders in the local church; recruiting the primary church leaders to participate in the Model Follow Me DBS group; preparing curriculum for the Model Follow Me DBS group; and initial 3-6 Follow Me DBS group meetings with the primary church leaders. This group must meet every week.

- Alternative for associate Pastors or non-pastors – You must be in this group with a pastor and must co-lead it
 - **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** These women will recruit and train (in a women’s Follow Me group) the wives of the primary male leaders as well as any other primary leaders who are female. Use the total of these two types of leaders as the number of primary women leaders they might train.
3. **3.3 Evangelism Training for Primary Leaders (10 grading points)**
Teach the complete Evangelism Training Course to the **primary leaders** (church staff, elected leaders, adult influencers, adult group leaders and disciple makers) and Outreach Come and See apprentices who are part of your Model Follow Me group. **(If you use a seminar format to teach this course to your congregation then you can combine training your primary leaders with training the adults in your congregation—assignments 3.3 and 3.4)**
 - (Alternative for non-pastors – You must be in this group and must co-lead it)
 - **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** Women will recruit and train (in a woman’s Follow Me group) the wives of the primary male leaders as well as any other primary leaders who are female..
 4. **3.4 Evangelism Training for Adult Congregation Members (10 grading points)**
Teach the complete Evangelism Training Course to your adult congregation, either in a seminar or in small groups. Teach your congregation to use the “Matthew Party” as part of this training. (If you desire, assign one or more of your Model Follow Me group apprentices to do this teaching)
 - Alternative for non-pastors – You must be in this training and must co-lead it
 - **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** These women are not required to teach but must assist in facilitating the training course. They will receive a “4” for this assignment if they assist in this training.
 5. **3.5 Launch Model Outreach Come and See DBS (15 grading points)**
With the Outreach Come and See group leaders you recruited into the Model Follow Me group launch at least one Model Outreach “Come and See group” in accordance with the plan you made to start Come and See groups in Course 3 and meet at least four times before Course 4. Your Model Outreach Come and See group(s) must be made up of at least 30% (and preferably more than 50%) of persons who were not previously attending your church. In a Model Outreach Come and See group you should have several *apprentice leaders who plan to later launch their own groups. **If you are using a “house church” model, this Outreach Come and See group will be your first church plant! Provision: Women who are restricted from training men will lead an Outreach Come and See group made up of women.** (Alternative for non-pastors – You must lead or co-lead an Outreach Come and See group).
 6. **3.6 Training Center Prospects (10 grading points)**
Continue to make appointments between courses 3 and 4 to promote your new training center and begin to collect T-Net Training Center Applications and fees. You should continue to work on this until you have at least 8-10 total applications collected from your own prospect list. New prospects given to you by those you already registered will help. (When a pastor knows his friend already signed up, he will be more open to do the same.) You will be graded on the number of T-Net Training Center Applications /fees turned in (not on the number who promised to do this later.) Your goal is to get 10 or more total T-Net Training Center Applications by Course 5.
 7. **3.7 Grammar Refresher (5 grading points)**

 - **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** Women will recruit and train (in a woman’s Follow Me group) the wives of the primary male leaders as well as any other primary leaders who are female.
4. **4.4 Training Adult Congregation Members in Steps Toward Spiritual Growth (7 grading points)**
Teach the complete Steps Toward Spiritual Growth (STSG) course to your entire adult congregation, either in a seminar or in small groups. (If you desire, assign one or more of the primary leaders in your Model Follow Me group apprentices to do this teaching)

5. **4.5 Launch Model Outreach Come and See DBS (10 grading points)**
With the Outreach Come and See group leaders you recruited into the Model Follow Me group launch at least one Model Outreach “Come and See group” in accordance with the plan you made to start Come and See groups in Course 3 and meet at least six times before Course 5. In a Model Outreach Come and See group you should have several *apprentice leaders who plan to later launch their own groups. **If you are using a “house church” model, this Outreach Come and See group will be your first church plant!**

The student will gather data to document and monitor results of implantation steps taken to revitalize the local church as a disciple making church: worship attendance, average weekly giving, disciple making leadership training, disciple making group multiplication, training church members in evangelism and Bible study methods, Outreach Come and See (house church) apprentices and house church plants, and Great Commission expansion. (*FP452 spans six terms for a total of 3 credit hours.*)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: TP471s Teaching Practicum: Finishing the Great Commission

In these teaching practicums, a student must recruit pastors from a selected region to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group to learn what the student has been taught and implemented in his/her ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5 or more pastors to attend the Tier 1 Training Center study group. Sessions are divided between the training team. However, each student is responsible to review and prepare as if they were to facilitate every session. These facilitators have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by becoming trainers to their peers, their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate this cohort learning experience. See the following definition of the Teaching Practicum Facilitators:

Teaching Practicum Facilitators

Each Teleo-Network (T-Net) Training Center study group has a lead trainer and one or more assistant trainers who serve as the facilitators of the distance education course. All students are given all the lecture notes and resources created by Teleo University faculty and subject experts. Therefore, in theory, no student would need a lecturer or training class to complete the program of study. However, Teleo University is committed to a cohort discipleship learning model where there are one or more trainer/facilitators who have implemented and applied the principles taught in the curriculum. The discipleship model also requires that each student train others in what they have received. Therefore, every student is trained as a trainer. They train the members of their church, they train new church planters, and they assist as part of a cohort facilitator team to train other pastors.

In the Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry Pastoral Major program a student must recruit, facilitate or assist in facilitating a Training Center study group and “coach” five students to each recruit and train five other pastors in a next-generation Training Center study group. During this Ministry Practicum new students are coached and supervised to successfully understand the content of the Term 1 textbook, *Finishing the Great Commission*, and complete the required assignments. Through this Ministry Practicum students learn to accomplish more through leading others than through direct ministry involvement. (MP461 spans six terms for a total of 3.5 credit hours.)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: BT442s Biblical Disciple Making

In this course, students complete a biblical study of the Gospels to identify the beliefs, values, attitudes, and behaviors that Jesus commanded and expected of His followers at each phase of their spiritual development. Students learn how to develop these transformational indicators into a written sequential definition for making a disciple how to redesign church programming to help form disciples to experience these. Students learn how to facilitate Course 2 for their training center students to train more disciple-making leaders and church planters. As facilitators, the students will also help their students effectively recruit students for next-generation training centers.

Credits: 9 credit hours (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

By completing the assigned reading, the students make significant contributions to the study group discussions and become better prepared to teach the material to their church leaders. 2. **6.2 Graduate Model Follow Me Group Participants (5 grading points)**
 Graduate a majority of your primary church leaders and Outreach Come and See (house church planting) apprentices from your Model Follow Me group. They should have finished the Follow Me group Discovery Bible Study (or other approved) curriculum from Course 1 or 2 and the following apprentice lessons and training courses:
 - Making and Multiplying Disciples (27 lessons)
 - Disciple Making Small Group Leader Training (21 lessons)
 - Evangelism Training Course (11 lessons)
 - Steps Toward Spiritual Growth (12 lessons)
 - Bible Study Methods sessions (12 lessons).

3. **6.3 Training Primary Leaders in Bible Study Methods (BSM) (5 grading points)**
 Finish teaching all the Bible Study Methods lay version lessons to the primary leaders and Outreach Come and See apprentices who are part of your Model Follow Me group. **(If you use a seminar format to teach this course to your congregation then you can combine training your primary leaders with training the adults in your congregation—assignments 6.3 and 6.4)**
 - (Alternative for non-pastors – You must be in this group and must co-lead it)
 - **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:**
 Women will recruit and train (in a woman’s Follow Me group) the wives of the primary male leaders as well as any other primary leaders who are female.

4. **6.4 Training Adult Church Members in Bible Study Methods (BSM) (5 grading points)**
 Complete training all Bible Study Methods lay version lessons to the adult members and attendees in your church. **(If you use a seminar format to teach this course to your congregation then you can combine training your primary leaders with training the adults in your congregation—assignments 6.3 and 6.4)**
 - (Alternative for non-pastors – You must be in this group and must co-lead it)
 - **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** Women will recruit and train (in a woman’s Follow Me group) the wives of the primary male leaders as well as any other primary leaders who are female..

5. **6.5 Launch New Outreach Come and See DBS Groups (5 grading points)**
 Release one or more apprentices from your Model Outreach Come and See group to launch new Outreach “Come and See” Discovery Bible Study groups that meet 6-10 times before Course 7. If you are using a “house church” model, these Outreach Come and See group will be your house church plants. Continue to meet with your Outreach Come and See group leaders in a Model Follow Me group and train them in all the manuals and courses listed in assignment 6.2 above.
 - **Provision:** Women who are restricted from training men will lead an Outreach Come and See group made up of women.
 - (Alternative for non-pastors – You must lead or co-lead an Outreach Come and See group)

6. **6.6 Church Planter Apprentice Training (10 grading points)**
 Select 1-4 of your Outreach Come and See home group leaders to train using the ***Church Planter Apprentice Training*** manual. Meet one-on-one or as a group and have at least 12 apprenticeship meetings between courses 6 and 7. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor are the same as in assignment 2.5.)

7. **6.7 Adopt a Remote Training Center (5 grading points)**
 Coordinate with your T-Net country director and board to lead the pastors in the training center you are teaching to adopt a (remote) part of your country appropriate to the generation of training you are in, and raise money and make plans to finish the Great Commission there, as you learned in your training. Identify a specific location to start a training center in that region, a specific date to begin promotion, and a specific date to begin teaching Course 1 or CCM C-1 there. (Starting a remote training center is a strategic initiative that requires approval and coordination with the country director and board. There should be multiple centers that partner to adopt, fund, promote, a training center in a new part of the country.)

8. **6.8 Disciple Making “Recipe” (5 grading points)**
 As a class, appoint an editing committee to use the work you did in class and edit the “sample recipe” into a complete rough draft of your recipe. The editing committee must bring a printed copy of this document to class (one for every student in the class. Each student will pay for his/her copy of this.) **If possible**, the editing committee should also bring a digital copy of their work and a computer to use to finish the job. For this assignment, all students will get the same grade, benefiting or suffering equally for the work of the committee unless they did not pay for their own copy. We encourage you to help motivate your committee to do its best!

COURSE DESCRIPTION: FP452.4s Field Project Implementation in the Local Church

The Field Project for the Pastoral Ministry program documents how the pastor or staff have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Documenting field project implementation is the focus during terms 3-8 of the program. The student will gather data to document and monitor results of implantation steps taken to revitalize the local church as a disciple making church: worship attendance, average weekly giving, disciple making leadership training, disciple making group multiplication, training church members in evangelism and Bible study methods, Outreach Come and See (house church) apprentices and house church plants, writing and employing a sequential biblical definition of a disciple and corresponding small group curriculum, and Great Commission expansion. (*FP452 spans six terms for a total of 3 credit hours.*)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: TP472s Teaching Practicum: Apprenticing Disciple Makers and Church Planters

In these teaching practicums, a student must recruit pastors from a selected region to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group to learn what the student has been taught and implemented in his/her ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5 or more pastors to attend the Tier 1 Training Center study group. Sessions are divided between the training team. However, each student is responsible to review and prepare as if they were to facilitate every session. These facilitators have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by becoming trainers to their peers, their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate this cohort learning experience. See the following definition of the Teaching Practicum Facilitators:

Teaching Practicum Facilitators

Each Teleo-Network (T-Net) Training Center study group has a lead trainer and one or more assistant trainers who serve as the facilitators of the distance education course. All students are given all the lecture notes and resources created by Teleo University faculty and subject experts. Therefore, in theory, no student would need a lecturer or training class to complete the program of study. However, Teleo University is committed to a cohort discipleship learning model where there are one or more trainer/facilitators who have implemented and applied the principles taught in the curriculum. The discipleship model also requires that each student train others in what they have received. Therefore, every student is trained as a trainer. They train the members of their church, they train new church planters, and they assist as part of a cohort facilitator team to train other pastors.

Credits: 2.25 credit hours (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

COURSE PROCEDURES AND POLICIES:

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COURSE DESCRIPTION: MP461.2s Coaching and Supervising a 1st Generation Training Center

In the Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry Pastoral Major program a student must recruit, facilitate or assist in facilitating a Training Center study group and “coach” five students to each recruit and train five other pastors in a next-generation Training Center study group. During this Ministry Practicum next generation students are coached and supervised to successfully understand the content of the Term 2 textbook, *Apprenticing Disciple Makers and Church Planters*, and complete the required assignments. Through this Ministry Practicum students learn to accomplish more through leading others than through direct ministry involvement. (MP461 spans six terms for a total of 3.5 credit hours.)

Credits: .5 credit hours (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The Ministry Practicum of coaching and supervising a next generation of students supports the following program outcomes.

- Empower students as trainers and equippers who multiply disciple making training and saturation church planting to finish the Great Commission.
- Recruit and train existing pastors and church leaders so they need not leave their current ministry positions but can apply their learning in their churches.
- Multiply ministry by training and developing lay leaders, church planters, and other pastors
- Training pastors and church leaders to revitalize local churches as disciple making churches.

6.15 Trainer-Student Monthly Coaching (Coaching and Supervising a 1st Generation Training Center)

Coach and supervise your next-generation training center students once each month for four months by making monthly coaching contacts with each assigned student. Meet in clusters of 2-3 or individually either face to face, video, or phone. Use the Monthly Coaching “Action Step Checklist” as a guide to coach your students to complete their training center assignments. **NOTE:** many of the extended training schedule formats allow for trainer-student monthly coaching before or after a training meeting or during lunch breaks.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: ML432s Whole Church Disciple Making

In this course, students learn how to train leaders in their church to lead various small groups to grow disciples sequentially and effectively from spiritual birth to maturity as Christ-followers. Students learn how to mobilize 60% - 95% of their church members into weekly intentional disciple making small groups and use apprentice training to multiply disciple making leaders in their church. Since implementing change is challenging within organizations, students learn how to do so graciously and effectively. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 3 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their church planter apprentices.

Credits: 8 credits (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

As a result of this course, the student will be able to:

- Train disciple making small group leaders for their entire church
- See 50%–80% of their people in intentional disciple making groups every week
- Train other pastors in evangelism and world religions
- Train other pastors to coach church planting apprentices

1. 7.1 Participation and Monthly Coaching (10 grading points)

Student fully participated in the T-Net Training Center study group and has written record of coaching call dates and notes in the Auxiliary Manual **Monthly Coaching "Action Step Checklist"** for this term.

Reading/Lecture Notes/ Group Discussions

Students are provided with all lecture notes and required to read and master all the material presented in the course manual (textbook). By completing the assigned reading, the students make significant contributions to the study group discussions and become better prepared to teach the material to their church leaders. They also begin to master the program content to prepare to become study group facilitators, mentors, and coaches for future students.

2. **7.2 Deploy Model Follow Me Group Graduates (5 grading points)**
Deploy graduates of your Model Follow Me group to lead Follow Me groups, Come and See groups, and Be with Me groups. Be sure you have all three kinds of small groups available for your church members when you implement your “Congregation-wide launch” of small groups. Be sure that Follow Me groups include the use of DBS Follow Me or other approved curriculum and that members attend training for Bible Study Methods and personal evangelism or that these two seminars are taught in the Follow Me group. Be sure Come and See level 2 groups offer personal evangelism training or that members attend this training. Be sure every group leader has at least one apprentice leader.
3. **7.3 Train a Be with Me Group Leader (5 grading points)**
Train at least one small group leader to lead a Be with Me (BM) group and prepare him/her to lead one during and after the church-wide launch..
4. **7.4 Church-Wide Launch of Disciple Making Small Groups (5 grading points)**
Implement your church-wide launch of small groups and recruit at least 80% of your adult worship attendees to attend a group for at least 8 weeks. Do all you can to end up with at least 60% ongoing attendance in these disciple making small groups. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor – You must plan this with a senior pastor and make some of the announcements yourself. You will receive the same grade as your pastor).
5. **7.5 Launch New Outreach Come and See DBS Groups (5 grading points)**
Release one or more apprentices from your Model Outreach Come and See group to launch new Outreach “Come and See” Discovery Bible Study groups that meet 6-10 times before Course 8. If you are using a “house church” model, these Outreach Come and See group will be your house church plants. Continue to meet with your Outreach Come and See group leaders in a Model Follow Me group until they have completed all the manuals and courses listed in Assignment 6.2.
 - **Provision:** Women who are restricted from training men will lead an Outreach Come and See group made up of women.
 - (Alternative for non-pastors – You must lead or co-lead an Outreach Come and See group).
6. **7.6 Church Planter Apprentice Training (10 grading points)**
Select 1-4 of your Outreach Come and See home group leaders to train using the **Church Planter Apprentice Training** manual. Meet one-on-one or as a group and have 12 weekly apprenticeship meetings between courses 7 and 8. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor are the same as in assignment 2.5.)
7. **7.7 Disciple Making “Recipe” (5 grading points)**
Recipe for a disciple is finished, and a finished copy is paid for and given to every member of the class. For this assignment, all students will get the same grade, benefiting or suffering equally for the work of the class and editing committee.
8. **7.8 Training Adult Congregation Members in Steps To Freedom in Christ (5 grading points)**
Offer the Steps To Freedom In Christ course to the adults in your congregation either in a seminar or in small groups (If you desire, train some or all of the primary leaders from your Model Follow Me group then allow them to do this teaching in small groups).
 - Alternative for non-pastors – You must be in this training and must co-lead it
 - **Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men:** These women are not required to teach but must assist in facilitating the training course. They will receive a “4” for this assignment if they assist in this training.
9. **7.9 Adopt a Remote Training Center (5 grading points)**
Continue to discuss plans with pastors in the training center you are teaching to adopt a (remote) part of your country appropriate to the generation of training you are in, and raise money and make plans to finish the Great Commission there, as you learned in your training. Coordinate with your T-Net country director and board to identify a specific location to start a training center in that region, a specific date to begin promotion, and a specific date to begin teaching Course 1 there.
10. **7.10 Sermon Outlines (15 grading points)**
(Provision for women whose denomination or culture restricts them from leading men: These women are exempted from preaching in a church for this assignment, but not from preaching in class, unless cultural norms restrict it.)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: FP452.5s Field Project Implementation in the Local Church

The Field Project for the Pastoral Ministry program documents how the pastor or staff have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. Documenting field project implementation is the focus during terms 3-8 of the program. The student will gather data to document and monitor results of implantation steps taken to revitalize the local church as a disciple making church: worship attendance, average weekly giving, disciple making leadership training, disciple making group multiplication, training church members in evangelism and Bible study methods, Outreach Come and See (house church) apprentices and house church plants, writing and employing a sequential biblical definition of a disciple and corresponding small group curriculum, and Great Commission expansion. (*FP452 spans six terms for a total of 3 credit hours.*)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: TP473s Teaching Practicum: Evangelism and World Religions

In these teaching practicums, a student must recruit pastors from a selected region to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group to learn what the student has been taught and implemented in his/her ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5 or more pastors to attend the Tier 1 Training Center study group. Sessions are divided between the training team. However, each student is responsible to review and prepare as if they were to facilitate every session. These facilitators have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by becoming trainers to their peers, their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate this cohort learning experience. See the following definition of the Teaching Practicum Facilitators:

Teaching Practicum Facilitators

Each Teleo-Network (T-Net) Training Center study group has a lead trainer and one or more assistant trainers who serve as the facilitators of the distance education course. All students are given all the lecture notes and resources created by Teleo University faculty and subject experts. Therefore, in theory, no student would need a lecturer or training class to complete the program of study. However, Teleo University is committed to a cohort discipleship learning model where there are one or more trainer/facilitators who have implemented and applied the principles taught in the curriculum. The discipleship model also requires that each student train others in what they have received. Therefore, every student is trained as a trainer. They train the members of their church, they train new church planters, and they assist as part of a cohort facilitator team to train other pastors.

During this Ministry Practicum next generation students are coached and supervised to successfully understand the content of the Term 3 textbook, *Evangelism and World Religions*, and complete the required assignments. Through this Ministry Practicum students learn to accomplish more through leading others than through direct ministry involvement. (*MP461 spans six terms for a total of 3.5 credit hours.*)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: PM443s Growing a Healthy Church

In this course, students will learn church health and growth principles and bring correction and healing to unhealthy church issues. Students learn how to develop a disciple making philosophy of ministry for their church to unify church leaders and focus limited resources. They will learn how to develop a Ministry Community to sustain and disciple their disciple makers. Finally, they will increase their understanding of how to develop new leaders through apprentice training. Students also learn how to facilitate Course 4 to their training center pastors and help students effectively recruit others for next-generation training centers.

Credits: 11 credits (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

As a result of this course, the student will be able to:

- Protect their church from unhealthy disagreements and church splits
- Effectively disciple their disciple makers
- Develop apprentice training throughout their church and to multiply ministry leaders
- Understand church health and keep their church healthy

- See additional people come to faith in Christ and new church plants
- See their training center pastors finalize recruitment for next-generation pastor training centers

1. **8.1 Participation and Monthly Coaching (10 grading points)**
Student fully participated in the T-Net Training Center study group and has written record of coaching call dates and notes in the Auxiliary Manual **Monthly Coaching "Action Step Checklist"** for this term.

Reading/Lecture Notes/ Group Discussions

Students are provided with all lecture notes and required to read and master all the material presented in the course manual (textbook). By completing the assigned reading, the students make significant contributions to the study group discussions and become better prepared to teach the material to their church leaders. They also begin to master the program content to prepare to become study group facilitators, mentors, and coaches for future students.

2. **8.2 Proto-Ministry Community Launch (5 grading points)**
Initiate the Proto-Ministry Community with all of your small group leaders and meet two to six times before Course 9. You must meet in a Be with Me group with your disciple making leaders and also use one of the following two models to accomplish the five goals of a Ministry Community. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor: They must be in this proto-Ministry Community and also lead a small group or mid-sized group.)
 - Model 1 – The group meets for each week and does exclusive Be with Me group activities. But, on the fourth meeting of each month, it does a short Be with Me group plus it adds another 60 minutes to do the five goals of a Ministry Community.
 - Model 2 – The group meets every week (or at least twice monthly) to do Be with Me group activities and in the same meeting do the five goals of a Ministry Community..
3. **8.3 Mid-Sized Groups Launch (5 grading points)**
If your church chooses to use mid-sized groups, train leaders and launch one or two mid-sized groups patterned after what was taught in this course. (NOTE: This is not a requirement for all students as some disciple making philosophy of ministries do not use mid-sized groups) Or, if the timing is appropriate, create a mid-sized group fellowship(s) by gathering Discovery Bible Study groups that have reached people of a different culture who do not or cannot attend the worship services church..
4. **8.4 Recruit to Groups (5 grading points)**
Continue to recruit more persons into your disciple making pathway, ever increasing the percentage of members who are involved, until 60% to 75% are consistently involved in an intentional disciple making small group every week. Ensure that every small group has at least one apprentice and that these groups are multiplying every 12-24 months. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor – participate in a church that does this.)
5. **8.5 Church Planter Apprentice Training (5 grading points)**
Select 1-4 of your Outreach Come and See home group leaders to train using the **Church Planter Apprentice Training** manual. Meet one-on-one or as a group and complete the remaining church planter (CP) apprentice lessons in 8-12 weekly apprenticeship meetings between courses 8 and 9. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor are the same as in assignment 2.5.)
6. **8.6 Disciple Making Recipe Distributed (5 grading points)**
Give a printed copy of the Disciple Making “Recipe” to every leader and member of your church who can read and explain to them how to use it. Keep additional copies for new members and as they begin to regularly attend and teach them how to use it. This must become an ongoing activity of your church. Find a way for each person to pay for their own copy if possible. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor – participate in a church that does this.)
7. **8.7 Group Apprentices (5 grading points)**
Ensure that every small group has one or more apprentices so that these groups can multiply every 12-24 months. (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor – participate in a church that does this.)
8. **8.8 Stewardship Preaching (5 grading points)**
Re-teach the stewardship material you were taught in Course 1. Implement all nine steps. Preach a four-week series on this as taught. Use different sermons this time. Be sure to use testimonies from persons who made commitments last year. Use signed commitment cards and the “Money-Back Guarantee” as taught for the highest score. Increase your weekly giving by at least 10%. (Alternatives for students who are not the senior pastor are the same as in the Course 1 assignment).
9. **8.9 Adopt a Remote Training Center (5 grading points)**
Coordinate with your T-Net country director, board and other centers to finalize plans to adopt a (remote) part of your country appropriate to the generation of training you are in, and raise money and make plans to finish the Great Commission there, as you learned in your training. Plan a specific location to start a training center in that region, a specific date to begin promotion, and a specific date to begin teaching Course 1 there..
10. **8.10 Philosophy of Ministry Draft (5 grading points)**
Lead your leaders to write and approve a rough draft of a disciple making philosophy of ministry with all six elements. Bring this, in writing, to Course 9. (Students who are not the senior pastor must help a pastor achieve this and will get the same grade as the pastor they help.).
11. **8.11 Numerical Growth Analysis (5 grading points)**
Do an analysis of your numerical growth. Choose at least one application you feel would be most helpful. Bring the analysis and written plan for the application back to Course 9.
12. **8.12 Spiritual Growth Analysis (5 grading points)**

COURSE DESCRIPTION: TP474s Teaching Practicum: Bible Study Methods and Sermon Preparation

In these teaching practicums, a student must recruit pastors from a selected region to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group to learn what the student has been taught and implemented in his/her ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5 or more pastors to attend the Tier 1 Training Center study group. Sessions are divided between the training team. However, each student is responsible to review and prepare as if they were to facilitate every session. These facilitators have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by becoming trainers to their peers, their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate this cohort learning experience. See the following definition of the Teaching Practicum Facilitators:

Teaching Practicum Facilitators

Each Teleo-Network (T-Net) Training Center study group has a lead trainer and one or more assistant trainers who serve as the facilitators of the distance education course. All students are given all the lecture notes and resources created by Teleo University faculty and subject experts. Therefore, in theory, no student would need a lecturer or training class to complete the program of study. However, Teleo University is committed to a cohort discipleship learning model where there are one or more trainer/facilitators who have implemented and applied the principles taught in the curriculum. The discipleship model also requires that each student train others in what they have received. Therefore, every student is trained as a trainer. They train the members of their church, they train new church planters, and they assist as part of a cohort facilitator team to train other pastors.

During this Ministry Practicum next generation students are coached and supervised to successfully understand the content of the Term 4 textbook, *Bible Study Methods and Sermon Preparation*, and complete the required assignments. Through this Ministry Practicum students learn to accomplish more through leading others than through direct ministry involvement. (MP461 spans six terms for a total of 3.5 credit hours.)

Credits: .5 credit hours (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The Ministry Practicum of coaching and supervising a next generation of students supports the following program outcomes.

- Empower students as trainers and equippers who multiply disciple making training and saturation church planting to finish the Great Commission.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: BT423s Survey of Old and New Testaments

Students gain an overview of all the Old and New Testament books of the Bible in this course. Students will be taught fifteen books of the Bible in greater depth and receive lesson outlines for every Bible book, including Bible walk-throughs and Bible overviews. Students learn how to facilitate Course 5 to the pastors attending their training center study groups and coach their training center students on launching new next-generation training centers.

Credits: 9 credit hours (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

- Teach other pastors and lay leaders how to understand and teach the Old Testament and New Testament to their entire congregations in less than ten years

Student fully participated in the T-Net Training Center study group and has written record of coaching call dates and notes in the Auxiliary Manual **Monthly Coaching "Action Step Checklist"** for this term.

Reading/Lecture Notes/ Group Discussions

Students are provided with all lecture notes and required to read and master all the material presented in the course manual (textbook). By completing the assigned reading, the students make significant contributions to the study group discussions and become better prepared to teach the material to their church leaders. They also begin to master the program content to prepare to become study group facilitators, mentors, and coaches for future students.

2. **9.2 Ministry Community (5 grading points)**
Meet with all of your small group leaders every month to accomplish the five goals of a Ministry Community (see Course 8). First, your disciple making leaders must meet regularly in a Be with Me group made up of other disciple maker group leaders. Then, you may continue your proto-Ministry Community (option 1 for churches with less than 180 adults) or launch a larger Ministry Community (option 2 for churches with more than 180 adults and more than 15 disciple making group leaders).

(Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor: They must be in the Ministry Community and also lead a small group or mid-sized group.)

- **Option 1:** Continue the Proto-Ministry Community if you have 15 or fewer disciple making leaders (see Proto-Ministry Community Assignment 8.2 Model 1 or 2).
 - **Option 2:** A Ministry Community meeting must have 1) a general session lasting 15-30 min, 2) a discipleship session with accountability lasting 60 min, and 3) a coaching and training session lasting 30-45 min. (Alternative: students who are not the senior pastor must be in this proto-Ministry Community and also lead a small group or mid-sized group.)
3. **9.3 Teacher Training Course (5 grading points)**
Train all your small group leaders (and all mid-sized group leaders if you use these) in all lessons of the Teacher Training Course manual. You may choose to do this in your Ministry Community, so as not to require another meeting. Implement your plan to teach the whole Bible either in your small groups or in your mid-sized groups. . (Alternative: students who are not the senior pastor must be in this training or help with the training)
 4. **9.4 Recruit to Groups (5 grading points)**
Continue to recruit more persons into your disciple making pathway, ever increasing the percentage of members who are involved, until 60% to 75% are consistently involved in an intentional disciple making small group **every week**.
 5. **9.5 Organize Mid-Size Group Fellowships (5 grading points)**
Cluster Outreach Come and See DBS home groups into a mid-sized fellowships. May remain under the mother church or may be the formation of a new independent church or house church network.
 6. **9.6 Disciple Making Recipe (5 grading points)**
Continue to use your recipe as an ongoing tool of your church from now on. Find a way for each person to pay for their own copy if possible.
 7. **9.7 Group Apprentices (5 grading points)**
Ensure that every small group has one or more apprentices so that these groups can multiply every 12-24 months.
 8. **9.8 Adopt a Remote Training Center (5 grading points)**
Coordinate with your country director, board and other centers to hold a promotional meeting in the (remote) part of your country that you adopted with at least 25 pastors or 25% of evangelical pastors within 10 Km of this location. Recruit as many as possible to begin Course 1 or CCM C-1 in the next 4 months.
 9. **9.9 Philosophy of Ministry (10 grading points)**
Lead your leaders to approve a final draft of a disciple making philosophy of ministry with all six elements – in their own words. Have your congregation (or, your church’s highest authorizing body) vote to approve this POM. Bring this approved POM, in writing, to Course 10. (Alternative: students who are not the senior pastor must help a pastor accomplish this, and bring the finished result to the next course for grading)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: FP453.1s Field Project Report

The Field Project Report documents how well the pastor, staff, and lay leaders have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. The Field Project Report is typically 15-20 pages and is presented verbally at the final grading interview. It must include the Final Interview Ministry Data Sheets, the final Vital Signs Annual Report Form, and identify successes and failures in revitalizing the local church as an intentional disciple-making congregation of believers. The report includes an analysis of ministry data collected throughout the three years of implementation with a focus on the seven vital signs for disciple making church revitalization: 1) attendance growth, 2) giving growth, 3) the number of disciple making leaders, 4) the number of disciple making groups, 5) the number of converts, 6) the number of church planting apprentices, and 7) the number of churches planted by the congregation. Students should also report if and how they contextualized the training to the congregation's ethnicity/culture and surrounding cultures. Finally, the insights learned by the student should be summarized and stated as principles, and the report may include a list of questions for further study. (*FP453 spans two terms for a total of 1 credit hour.*)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: TP475s Teaching Practicum: Coaching Leaders and Multiplying Ministry

In these teaching practicums, a student must recruit pastors from a selected region to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group to learn what the student has been taught and implemented in his/her ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5 or more pastors to attend the Tier 1 Training Center study group. Sessions are divided between the training team. However, each student is responsible to review and prepare as if they were to facilitate every session. These facilitators have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by becoming trainers to their peers, their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate this cohort learning experience. See the following definition of the Teaching Practicum Facilitators:

Teaching Practicum Facilitators

Each Teleo-Network (T-Net) Training Center study group has a lead trainer and one or more assistant trainers who serve as the facilitators of the distance education course. All students are given all the lecture notes and resources created by Teleo University faculty and subject experts. Therefore, in theory, no student would need a lecturer or training class to complete the program of study. However, Teleo University is committed to a cohort discipleship learning model where there are one or more trainer/facilitators who have implemented and applied the principles taught in the curriculum. The discipleship model also requires that each student train others in what they have received. Therefore, every student is trained as a trainer. They train the members of their church, they train new church planters, and they assist as part of a cohort facilitator team to train other pastors.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: MP462.1s Coaching and Supervising 2nd Generation Training Centers

In the Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry Pastoral Major program a student must recruit, train and “coach” five students to each recruit and train five other pastors in a next-generation Tier 1 Training Center. While taking courses 1-5 the student, along with others on their training center team, recruits next-generation center pastors as students. After Course 5 the training center team begins the process with their 1st generation training center class. The 2nd generation training centers begin as the initial training team take courses 9 and 10. If there is no attrition, the three members of the training team will each recruit five pastors who will, in turn, recruit five each for five new training centers. The combined total of the second generation students will be 75 pastors. Therefore, the goal of this Ministry Practicum is to help students learn to accomplish more through leading others than through direct ministry involvement. During this Ministry Practicum next generation students are coached and supervised to successfully coach and supervise their students to understand the content of the Term 1 textbook, *Finishing the Great Commission*, and complete the required assignments. (MP462 spans two terms for a total of 1 credit hour.)

BT424S SURVEY OF BIBLE DOCTRINE T-Net International School of Ministry TERM 10 COURSE SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION: BT424s Survey of Bible Doctrine

In this course, students complete a survey of fourteen Bible doctrines and an overview of church history in this course. Students will learn to preserve unity among Christians who hold diverse views on doctrines not central to the Christian faith. Students will consider how they will approach controversial doctrines such as the woman's role in ministry, the gift of tongues, and the prosperity gospel. Finally, students learn how to facilitate Course 6 to the pastors attending their training center and coach their students to teach Course 2 in a third-generation training center.

2. Local libraries are additional sources for information and research. Ask your group facilitator for local language library resources. Possibilities include:
 - Local colleges, seminaries, and universities
 - Public libraries
 - Church libraries, pastors' libraries, and other professionals' libraries

COURSE REQUIREMENTS / ASSIGNMENTS / GRADE POINTS:

Reading/Lecture Notes/ Group Discussions

Students are provided with all lecture notes and required to read and master all the material presented in the course manual (textbook). By completing the assigned reading, the students make significant contributions to the study group discussions and become better prepared to teach the material to their church leaders. They also begin to master the program content to prepare to become study group facilitators, mentors, and coaches for future students.

2. **10.2 Ministry Community (10 grading points)**
Meet with all of your small group leaders every month to accomplish the five goals of a Ministry Community (see Course 8). First, your disciple making leaders must meet regularly in a Be with Me group made up of other disciple maker group leaders. Then, you may continue your proto-Ministry Community (option 1 for churches with less than 180 adults) or launch a larger Ministry Community

(option 2 for churches with more than 180 adults and more than 15 Disciple Making Group leaders). (Alternative for students who are not the senior pastor: They must be in the Ministry Community and also lead a small group or mid-sized group.)

- **Option 1:** Continue the Proto-Ministry Community if you have 15 or fewer disciple making leaders (for Proto-Ministry Community requirements see Assignment 8.2 Model 1 or 2).
 - **Option 2:** A Ministry Community meeting must have 1) a general session lasting 15-30 min, 2) a discipleship session with accountability lasting 60 min, and 3) a coaching and training session lasting 30-45 min. (Alternative: students who are not the senior pastor must be in this proto-Ministry Community and also lead a small group or mid-sized group.)
3. **10.3 Teaching Bible Doctrine (10 grading points)**
Train all your small group leaders (and all mid-sized group leaders if you use these) how to use the **Bible Doctrine Lessons** manual to instruct their group members. **Finish training any remaining lessons from the Teach Training Course before training your leaders in the six lessons of Part 1 in the Bible Doctrine Lessons manual.** You may choose to do this in your Ministry Community, so as not to require another meeting. Implement your plan to teach the survey of Bible and doctrine to your whole congregation preferably in your small groups or in your mid-sized groups. (Alternative: students who are not the senior pastor must be in this training or help with the training)
 4. **10.4 Recruit to Groups (5 grading points)**
Continue to recruit more persons into your disciple making pathway, ever increasing the percentage of members who are involved, until 60% to 75% are consistently involved in an intentional disciple making small group **every week.**
 5. **10.5 Disciple Making Recipe (5 grading points)**
Continue to use your recipe as an ongoing tool of your church from now on. Find a way for each person to have their own copy even if they cannot afford to pay for it.
 6. **10.6 Group Apprentices (5 grading points)**
Continue to ensure that every small group has one or more apprentices, and these groups are multiplying every 12-24 months.
 7. **10.7 Adopt a Remote Training Center (5 grading points)**
Coordinate with your T-Net country director, board and other centers to **launch Course 1** or CCM C-1 in the (remote) part of your country that you adopted. The goal is to have 15-25 pastors or 25% of evangelical pastors within 10 km of this location.
 8. **10.8 Accountability Partner (5 grading points)**
Continue to meet with your accountability partner at least every other week either in person or on the phone or internet. Hold each other lovingly accountable to continue to set new goals and make progress on your legacy.
 9. **10.9 Course Exam (10 grading points)**
Master the material in Course 10. Study for the exam and receive an appropriate score on your exam.
 10. **10.15 Reading and Research Reports (15 grading points)**
Read 2 books (or the equivalent number of articles) related to this term's subject(s). To develop and reinforce the habit of life-long learning through personal reading and research, students are required to identify relevant reading for which they write research notes and appropriate bibliography information to use in speaking or writing when quoting or paraphrasing the ideas of others. Students may choose books and articles from, but not limited to, the course recommended reading list posted at www.teleouniversity.org/readinglab. Complete one Reading and Research Report for each book or article (10 journal or web articles equal one book). Document the author, publisher, and bibliography information to create a proper source citation. Photocopy the Reading and Research forms in the Appendix or download PDF or Microsoft Word Reading and Research forms from www.teleouniversity.org/readinglab.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: FP453.2s Field Project Report

The Field Project Report documents how well the pastor, staff, and lay leaders have implemented the intentional disciple making principles and actionable steps in the local church. The Field Project Report is typically 15-20 pages and is presented verbally at the final grading interview. It must include the Final Interview Ministry Data Sheets, the final Vital Signs Annual Report Form, and identify successes and failures in revitalizing the local church as an intentional disciple-making congregation of believers. The report includes an analysis of ministry data collected throughout the three years of implementation with a focus on the seven vital signs for disciple making church revitalization: 1) attendance growth, 2) giving growth, 3) the number of disciple making leaders, 4) the number of disciple making groups, 5) the number of converts, 6) the number of church planting apprentices, and 7) the number of churches planted by the congregation. Students should also report if and how they contextualized the training to the congregation's ethnicity/culture and surrounding cultures. Finally, the insights learned by the student should be summarized and stated as principles, and the report may include a list of questions for further study. (*FP453 spans two terms for a total of 1 credit hour.*)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: TP476s Teaching Practicum: Foundations for a Disciple Making Church

In these teaching practicums, a student must recruit pastors from a selected region to participate in a T-Net Training Center study group to learn what the student has been taught and implemented in his/her ministry. Typically, two or three students will form a training team where each student has recruited 5 or more pastors to attend the Tier 1 Training Center study group. Sessions are divided between the training team. However, each student is responsible to review and prepare as if they were to facilitate every session. These facilitators have already taught this material to leaders within their churches. However, by becoming trainers to their peers, their learning heightens as they prepare to facilitate this cohort learning experience. Teaching Practicum Facilitators

Each Teleo-Network (T-Net) Training Center study group has a lead trainer and one or more assistant trainers who serve as the facilitators of the distance education course. All students are given all the lecture notes and resources created by Teleo University faculty and subject experts. Therefore, in theory, no student would need a lecturer or training class to complete the program of study. However, Teleo University is committed to a cohort discipleship learning model where there are one or more trainer/facilitators who have implemented and applied the principles taught in the curriculum. COURSE DESCRIPTION: MP462.2s Coaching and Supervising 2nd Generation Training Centers

In the Bachelor of Pastoral Ministry Pastoral Major program a student must recruit, train and “coach” five students to each recruit and train five other pastors in a next-generation Tier 1 Training Center. While taking courses 1-5 the student, along with others on their training center team, recruits next-generation center pastors as students. After Course 5 the training center team begins the process with their 1st generation training center class. The 2nd generation training centers begin as the initial training team take courses 9 and 10. If there is no attrition, the three members of the training team will each recruit five pastors who will, in turn, recruit five each for five new training centers. The combined total of the second generation students will be 75 pastors. Therefore, the goal of this Ministry Practicum is to help students learn to accomplish more through leading others than through direct ministry involvement. During this Ministry Practicum next generation students are coached and supervised to successfully coach and supervise their students to understand the content of the Term 1 textbook, *Finishing the Great Commission*, and complete the required assignments. (MP462 spans two terms for a total of 1 credit hour.)

Credits: .5 credit hours (40 hours of designated learning activity or academic engagement per credit hour)

READING AND RESEARCH REPORTS

Throughout your life, ministry, and education, you will need to preserve important quotes and concepts from reading and research and document the sources of that information as you write essays, sermons, and Field Project Report. Taking and organizing notes from reading is essential to research, writing, and speaking.

The following material provides a brief introduction to citation of sources for reading reports and research papers and the following tools:

- “Taking Notes From Research Reading” by Dr. Margaret Procter, University of Toronto.
- A “Reading and Research Report Form.”

Taking Reading and Research Notes

Taking notes is a crucial part of the research process because it helps you internalize the concepts you are learning, and it enables you to preserve and organize that information. There are many ways to take notes, but a sound notes system will provide the following:

- Bibliographic information about the source so you can cite it correctly so others can find it. Include items such as author, title, date published, publisher, and URL (if it is a website).
- A way to organize your notes by summary topics, keywords, or search terms.
- Space to capture key quotes (with page numbers from the source), important information from the text summarized or paraphrased (in your own words), and your questions, comments, and thoughts in responses to what you have read.

When taking notes, begin by looking through the document to get the main ideas and find where there is information most relevant to your research. Do not write down things you already know. Write down every fact or concept that will help you in your research. Indicate when you quote directly from the text and add the specific page location. Read the following article for more help in notetaking for research:

Taking Notes From Research Reading

Prepared by Dr. Margaret Procter, University of Toronto Coordinator, Writing Support

Taking notes efficiently is essential to your sanity in facing the wealth of information available in print and electronic form. It is also a key part of writing well-focused and coherently argued papers. Good notetaking strategies will help you read with more understanding and save time and frustration when you write your paper. These are three main principles:

Know What Kind of Ideas You Need to Record

Focus your approach to the topic before you start detailed research. Then you will read with a purpose in mind, and you will be able to sort out relevant ideas.

- Analyze the **assignment sheet** to be clear about just what you are going to do with your **topic**, and what your topic consists of. (See the file on *Understanding Essay Topics*).
- Then review the commonly known **facts** about your topic and become aware of the range of thinking and **opinions** on it. As well as your class notes and textbook, browse in an encyclopedia or other reference work.
- Try making a **preliminary list** of the subtopics you would expect to find in your reading. These will guide your attention and may come in handy as search terms and labels for notes.
- Choose a component or **angle** that interests you, perhaps one on which there is already some controversy.

Now formulate your **research question**. It should allow for reasoning as well as gathering of information--not just what the proto-Iroquoians ate, for instance, but how valid the evidence is for early introduction of corn. You may even want to jot down a tentative thesis statement as a preliminary answer to your question. (See the file *Using Thesis Statements* for the defining characteristics of a good thesis statement.)

- Then you will know what to look for in your research reading: **facts** and **theories** that help answer your question, and other people's **opinions** about the value of specific answers.

Do Not Write Down Too Much

Your essay must be an expression of your own thinking, not a patchwork of borrowed ideas. Plan therefore to invest your research time in understanding your sources and integrating them into your own thinking. Use your note cards or note sheets to record only ideas that are relevant to your focus on the topic and summarize rather than copy out or paraphrase.

- Copy out exact words only when the ideas are memorably phrased or surprisingly expressed--on the few occasions when you might use them as actual quotations.
- Otherwise, compress ideas in your own words. Paraphrasing word by word is a waste of time. Choose the most important ideas and write them down as labels or headings. Then fill in with a few subpoints that explain or exemplify.
- Do not depend on underlining and highlighting. Find your own words for notes in the margin (or on "sticky" notes).

Label Your Notes Intelligently

Whether you use cards or pages for notetaking, take notes in a way that allows for later use.

- Save [time and trouble] later by recording bibliographic information in a master list or computer file when you begin looking at each source (do not forget to notebook and journal information for photocopies). Then you can quickly identify each note by the author's name and page number; when you refer to sources in the essay you can fill in details of publication easily from your master list. Keep a format guide handy so you get details right from the start (see the file on Documentation Formats).
- Try as far as possible to put notes on separate cards or sheets. This will let you label the topic of each note. Not only will that keep your notetaking focused, but it will also allow for grouping and synthesizing of ideas later. It is especially satisfying to shuffle notes and see how the conjunctions create new ideas in your own thinking.
- Leave lots of space in your notes for comments of your own questions and reactions as you read, second thoughts and cross-references when you look back at what you have written. These comments can become a virtual first draft of your paper. (*Visit our many files offering advice about university writing at www.advice.writing.utoronto.ca*)

Citation of Sources for Reading Reports and Research Papers

It is critical to avoid plagiarism by citing the sources used in your writing. T-Net uses the Modern Language Association (MLA) system of citation. The following MLA citation summary is an introduction to this popular style guide.

Modified MLA Parenthetical Citation Style

The Modern Language Association (MLA) establishes values for acknowledging sources used in a research paper. MLA citation style uses a simple two-part parenthetical documentation system for citing sources: Citations in the text of a paper point to the alphabetical Works Cited list that appears at the end of the paper. Together, these references identify and credit the sources used in the paper and allow others to access and retrieve this material. **Teleo University provides a Style Guide with citation formatting at teleouniversity.org/writinglab.** Also, you may reference the current MLA formatting and citation guidelines online at owl.purdue.edu. We will focus only on gaining the information required for the "Works Cited" section.

Works Cited List

References cited in the text of a research paper must appear at the end of the paper in a Works Cited list or bibliography. This list provides the information necessary to identify and retrieve each source that supports your research.

- Arrange entries in alphabetical order by authors' last names (surnames), or by title for sources without authors.
- Capitalize the first word and all other main words of the titles and subtitles of cited works listed. (Do not capitalize articles, prepositions, coordinating conjunctions, or the "to" in infinitives.)
- Shorten the publisher's name; for example, omit articles, business abbreviations (Co., Inc.), and descriptive words (Press, Publisher).
- When multiple publishers are listed, include all of them, placing a semicolon between each.
- When more than one city is listed *for the same publisher*, use only the first city.
- Use the conjunction "and" not an ampersand [&] when listing multiple authors of a single work.
- **Pagination:** Do not use the abbreviations **p.** or **pp.** to designate page numbers.
- **Indentation:** Align the first line of the entry flush with the left margin and indent all subsequent lines (5 to 7 spaces) to form a "hanging indent."
- **Italics:** Choose a font in which the italic style contrasts clearly with the regular style.
